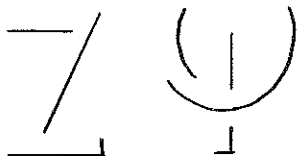

ALUMNI FUND:

The fund actually grew over the summer more than had been anticipated in the May 31 issue. This year we would like to see the fund go over \$1500. Numerous brothers stated in their letters that they intended to make annual contributions. It is this sort of feeling that we are trying to establish. The fund will get quite a boost this Fall from the house. Since we pledged 22 new men that will mean a \$160 check from the house. This figure is arrived at by multiplying the number of new pledges by \$7.50, a figure the house will give annually to the Alumni Fund. DELTA TAU DELTA WINS IN FRATERNITY COMPETITION

SCORE OVER SIGMA NU,

FOR 22 IN 48-49 CONTEST

With an advantage of four points over their nearest competitors Delta Tau Delta won the 1948-49 fraternity competition. Scoring 24 points, the DTDs ran ahead of Theta Delta Chi and Sigma Nu who tied for second.

In the four separate divisions of the competition, Beta Theta Pi took two firsts, in special events and athletics, while Pi Lambda Phi took the scholarship award. Zeta Psi took honors in the administration division.

A new athletic regime has been instituted here at Psi Epsilon, and winning teams will assuredly result. New spirit has been instilled in familiar faces who have previously represented the Zetas in athletic contests---a spirit supplemented by a fine group of pledge-athletes.

The House lost its first two football games by 12-0 scores, but the scores are not indicative of the calibre of the games. Sigma Nu, one of the campus' better grid machines, scored twice on freak plays after we had held them for three downs on the 20-yard stripe. Kappa Sig, by virtue of a sleeper play which caught our defensive backfield unaware, also edged the team. But we bounced back with a win over the DU's and brothers are certain that winning ways are here to stay.

Captain of the football team is Fred Brown, a former heavyweight on the wrestling team. Zetes are employing the two-platoon system, and have had so many potential greats that the varsity squad has undergone several cuts.

The offensive unit, which hasn't quite found its scoring punch, consists of Don Herdeg, Eric Gunderson, and Johnny McCrillis at the ends, Bill Woolner at tackle, and Jim Braunworth at center. Defensively the Zetes field Vin Rathburn and Jack Neehan at the flanks, Dick Hill, Bert Ibelle (the grand old man of Zeta Psi football), Dick Wallace and Dan Hall at the tackle slots, while Joe Caldwell works well in the defensive center role.

In Howie Carter, a talented pledge, the team has one of the finer passers on campus. Other backs include Fred Brown (Capt.), Jerry Crossley, Bob MacArthur, Jim Weidman, and young Tony Bachem who has received press notices in several Boston papers for his work with the Dartmouth varsity.

Optimism is the key on the field, and although the football season is nearly completed, Zetes look forward to their last game with the Dekes, and then to superior basketball and hockey seasons.

Meanwhile the Dartmouth varsity gridders have broken a Memorial Field record by virtue of the 16-7 upset win over Cornell last week. The Green, for the first time, won six consecutive games against major opposition.
