



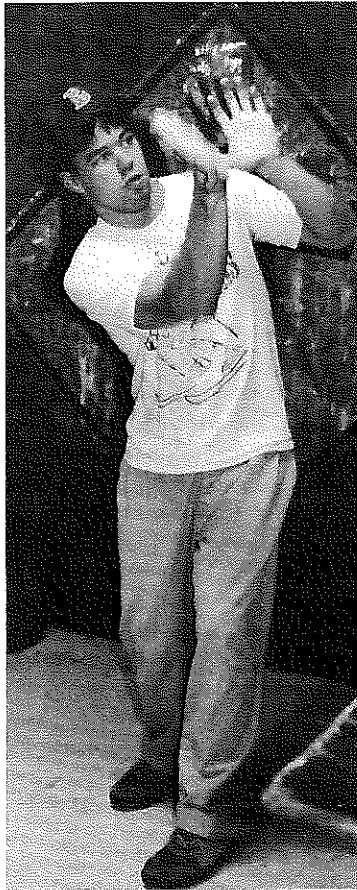

Zeta Psi Adapts To College Policies

After a beautiful Harvard weekend and a tremendous 17-0 win by the Big Green football team, I am forced to sit and reflect on the recent goings-on at the Hanover Zete. It's painful to think about how things have changed on the Hanover Plain and how many of our alumni are unaware of the effect new college policies have had on the chapter. When I told Peter Burack '83, a former Phi, that we have only 34 actives and 45 total members (a reflection of the D-plan) I thought he was going to choke on his beer. Yes, delayed rush has taken effect.

For those of you who are still sketchy on the policy of delayed rush, I will give a quick explanation. The policy first affected the class of 1993; the students who are now in their second year at Dartmouth are not allowed to rush until the winter of '91, and the '94s will not rush until the winter of '92. The delay leaves the chapter with only two active classes, putting us in a precarious financial situation and weakening morale. The dues for a brother not living in the house have risen to an incredible \$325 a term while house rent averages \$800 a term. As for morale, it is difficult to muster a lot of excitement in the house with 34 actives as opposed to 100 as in the old days.

On the brighter side, we are all excited over the arrival of pledges in the winter and are actively recruiting new members. I have a feeling campus-wide rush statistics may be lower than in years past, but Zete will not lower its standards of excellence and dedication to raise our numbers.

When I consider excellence in Zete, I think of our number-one GPA among fraternities and consistent production of campus leaders: Rick Gomez is currently president of the class of '91 while Brant Rose is president of the '92 class, and I am very active as treasurer in the Coed, Fraternity and Sorority Council. I fully expect the excellence of Zete to continue.

I am also pleased to announce that after spending an overwhelming sum of \$20,000 in renovations we passed Minimum Standards with commendation. Much of the money came from our savings, but we do owe the elder corporation money and are working things out with Gordon Prescott '83, our beloved corporation treasurer and still a good player of speed pong.

The Psi Epsilon Chapter will enter the new year with an excellent, newly elected executive committee. Jason Brickley '92, our current social chair, will take the helm

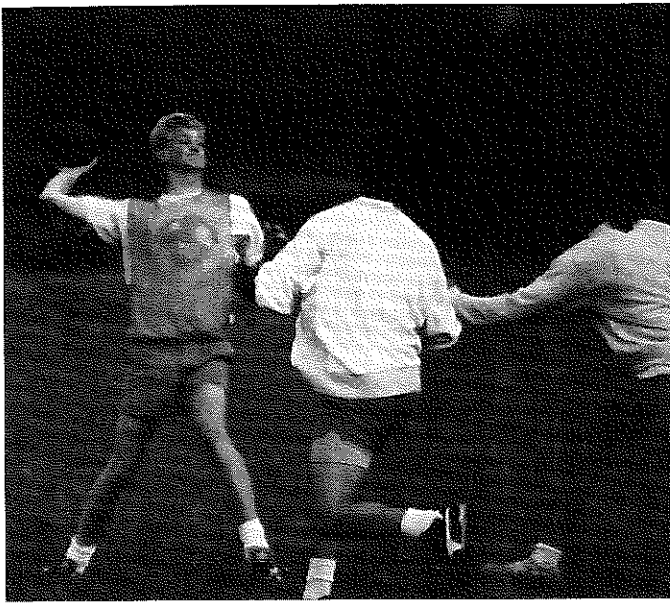
Actives Devote Much Time And Energy To Community Service

Despite the lower membership due to delayed rush, Zete has continued to stay active in both the Dartmouth and Upper Valley communities. Despite spending many hours of work preparing the house for Minimum Standards, the brothers still found time in the spring to solicit prizes and sell raffle tickets in our annual fund-raiser benefiting Norris Cotton Cancer Research. Over \$800 was raised and donated to that cause in the name of Todd Bruce '90. The past spring also saw Zete become the first fraternity on campus to host the R.E.A.C.T. rape awareness roadshow. The 30-minute film was followed

by a lengthy discussion about the legal and moral implications of date rape, which has become more common on college campuses in the past few years. Over 30 people, including many non-brethren, attended this important gender-related event. Toward the end of the spring, Zete hosted a spaghetti dinner to benefit the '91 class council. The Decibelles sang at this event coordinated by Rick Gomez '91.

As for the fall of 1990, our small number has not shrunk our community spirit. Zete is currently involved in a project

Zeta Psi Participates In Many Athletic Endeavors

This summer, Zete's '92 class engaged in a plethora of athletic endeavors. On the soccer field, Doug "Brewster" Miniati and Adam "Mooch" Farber sparked a powerful Zete offense to a 7-0 drubbing of the Seedlings. David Aznavorian anchored a stalwart defense in shutting out a very physical Seedlings squad. Zetes went on sabbatical for the rest of the season, however, as they fell 3-0 to both AD and Alpha Chi in subsequent contests.

We fared somewhat better on the softball diamond. All-star left fielder Jay Caggiano had a couple of dingers, powering Zete to an upset of a very large Beta squad. Raj Shah "Me..." played some outstanding D at the hot corner. Aznavorian rounded out a solid infield, reaching deep in the hole to make an outstanding putout at shortstop. After losing close ones to AD and Chi Gam, the Zete nine overwhelmed a team of "old people." In the playoffs, the season came to a crashing halt as Bill "Peat" Moss committed eight unassisted errors in a one-run loss to the Gate.

Zeta dominated the Dartmouth volleyball scene during the summer. Students came from as far away as the new dorms to see "Dumpy" Dave Roberts and Miniati put on an exhibition at the summer's "volleyball lodge."

In the fall, Zete football was limited to two first downs during the year. After a close 21-0 loss to a domineering Gamma Delt squad, coach Caggiano proceeded to place the whole team on waivers. As a result, the Mean Machine was forced to forfeit to Alpha Theta and the rest of its opponents.

Back to soccer, FC Zete finished an impressive 1-2-1. Zete opened with a 1-1 tie against Heorot. Miniati tallied Zete's lone score. Next, Zete thrashed an experienced Bones Gate club, 4-1. Miniati, Chris "Wunderkind" Stauss '91, Mark "Honey" Graham '91, and Mike "Stroke" Swire '91 notched one a piece. Keeper Randy "Chaka" Kahn '91 shut the door on a fierce Gate attack. The club fared less well against Psi U, falling 4-1. Swire had the lone netter on a perfectly executed one-on-zero. Miniati had an assist; unfortunately, it was on a Psi U goal. The team's season ended tragically against Theta Delt in the first round of the Hanover Cup. Brad "B. J." Johnson '92 scored a beautiful goal, but Zete could muster no more, falling 5-1 to the Blue Wall.

The major athletic event of the fall, without a doubt, was the third tri-annual Zete olympics. The winner? "We all lost," moaned a weary Mike Lazar '91 after surviving the competition.

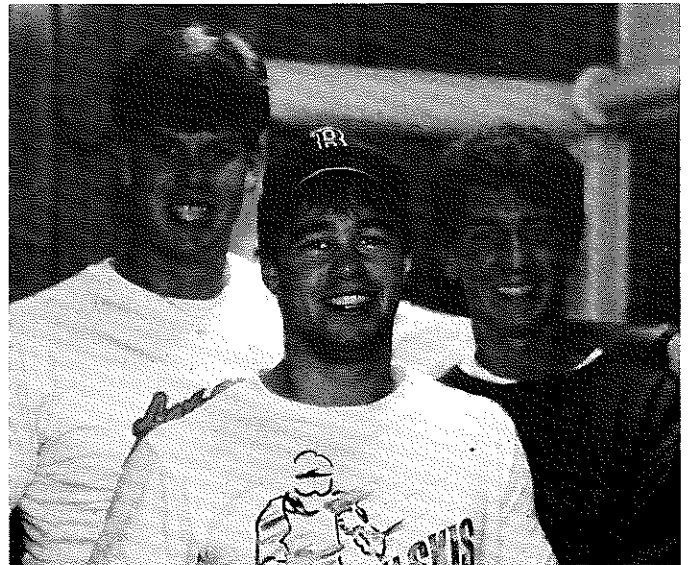

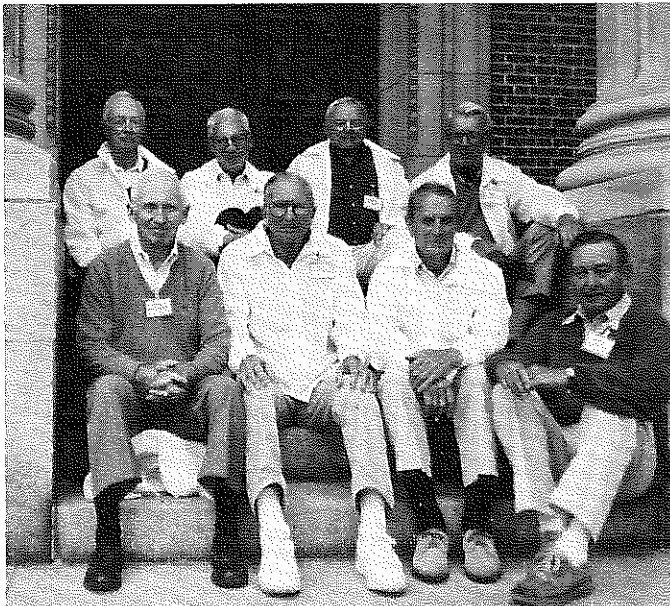

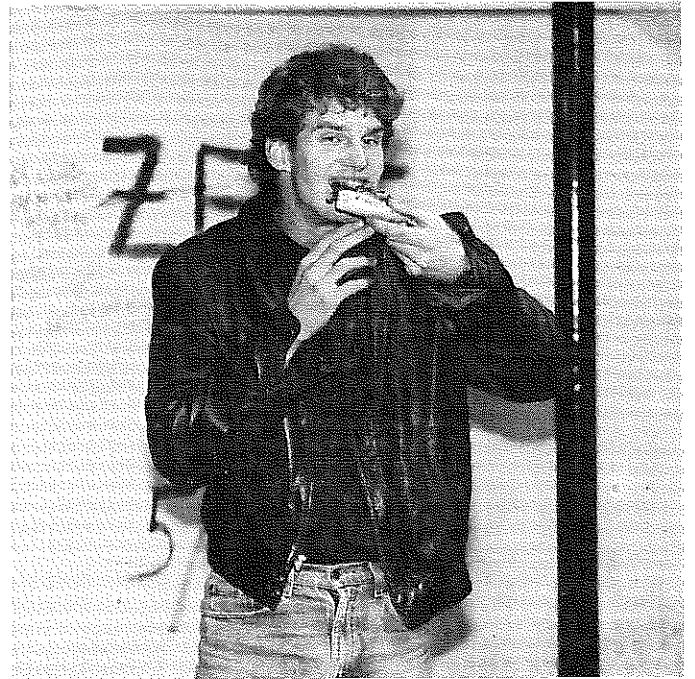
