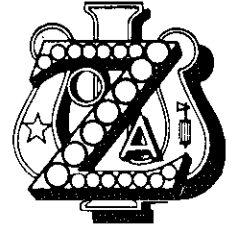

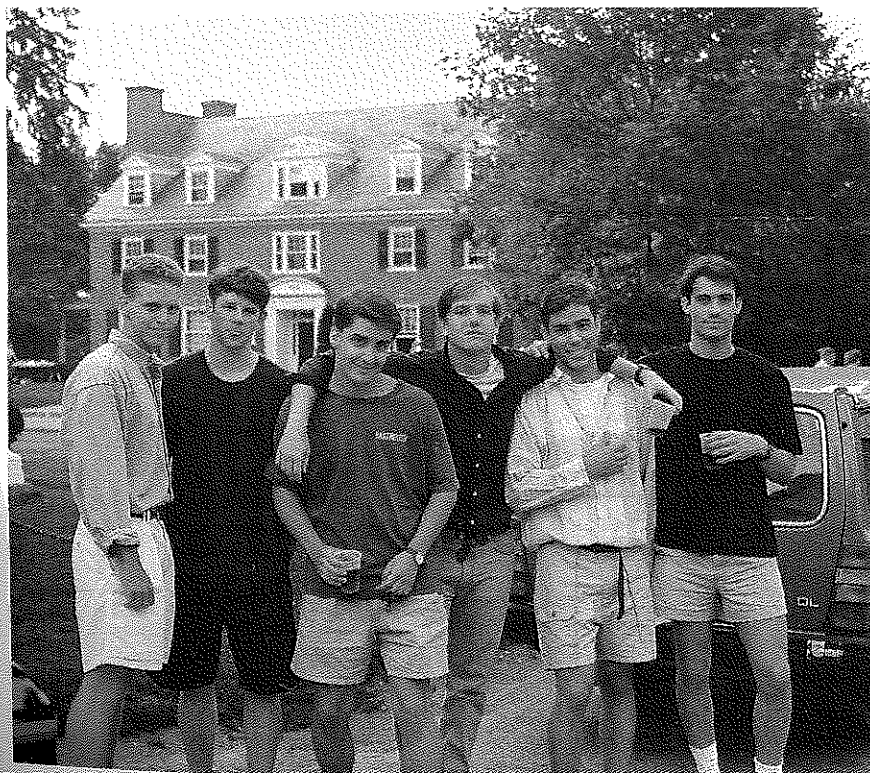

Minimum Standards Passed With Flying Colors

Over the past two terms Zeta has continued to demonstrate its leadership in programming and community service activities. To give you some perspective, Dartmouth Minimum Standards for fraternities requires that each fraternity be responsible for three events each term. Mike has recently been elected to continue as vice president, starting next term, for the upcoming year.

Some highlights of these events include raising money and sponsoring a child through the "Save the Children" foundation, participation in a program with prisoners at the Windsor Correctional Facility, and continued commitment to the student group Greeks Against Rape. This group was formed by Zeta brothers Josh Stein '92 and John Kim '92 at the end of last spring term. This organization is comprised of concerned students in the Greek system and is dedicated to dealing with issues of sexual assault on college campuses. Currently, Zeta brother Jordan Frank '94 is the acting president.

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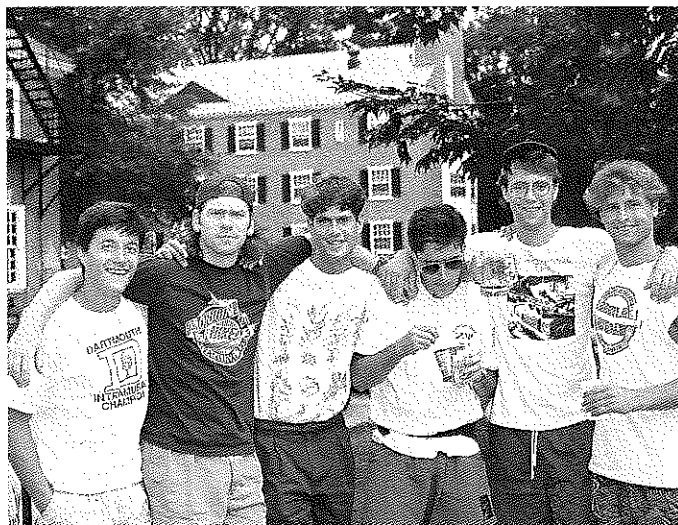

Psi Epsilon Social "Broadens Its Horizons"

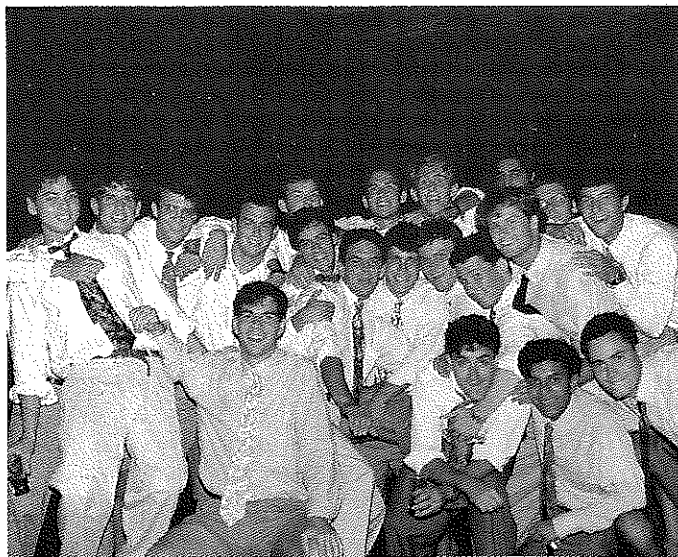

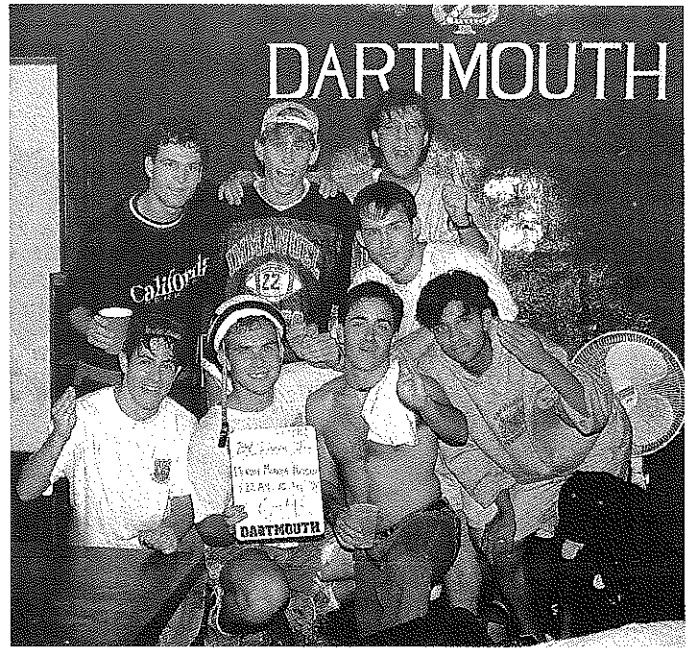
