## Zetes Excel In All Their Endeavors

All is well at 8 Webster Avenue. Once again, I am able to report that Zetes are excelling in everything from intramural sports to academics and campus leadership. I'll move directly to academics since our own Rick Hazelton '90 has a jock report inside. Not only has Zete continued to have a collective GPA well above that of the campus average, but we were recently awarded second place in the scholars category at a ceremony, held by the ORL, recognizing the achievements of the Greek system. This award was based on a weighted point total that counted the number of Phi Beta Kappas, Rufus Choate Scholars, and level two and three scholars in each organization. In addition to grades, Zetes applying to graduate schools have distinguished themselves on standardized entrance exams. The class of '90 scored an average of 44 points (out of a possible 48) on the LSAT. Two brothers even managed to achieve perfect scores of 48 on the exam.

With respect to campus leadership, Zete has several brothers about whom we can boast. Brant Rose '92 is vice president of the sophomore class. Ricky Gomez '91, who spent summer term as our social chair, is president of the junior class. Brian Urkowitz '90 has not only served as our own Alpha Phi, but sits on the

Student Assembly (SA) executive council as secretary and is heading up the SA Student Center Task Force. I am ending my tenure as IFC president. Although it was frustrating at times, I am glad to have had the experience.

In January the new officers, led by our new Phi, Rodger Cottrell '91, will take over with quite a challenge ahead. They will spend the next term-and-a-half getting ready for our Minimum Standards review this coming spring term. Several large improvements to the physical plant are planned. We intend to replace all carpeting in the house, refurnish the living room, repair the sagging basement ceiling, paint the entire interior, and carry out some renovations in the basement.

Although this is "the year that delayed rush forgot," we will have several sophomore pledges this winter term. Stig Colberg '90 will serve as pledge trainer. I am sure that by Winter Carnival he'll have them shipshape to meet you all. Hope to see you soon.

## Zeta Psi Continues To Uphold Its Tradition Of Leadership

As usual, the brothers of Zeta Psi have been active members of the Dartmouth community. We have excelled in athletics and academics, while maintaining an active social schedule. In addition to these accomplishments, Zetes have found time for educational, cultural, and community service events. The house continued to promote awareness of gender issues and began a new commitment to the environment.

Zeta Psi cosponsored two gender relations programs during fall term. The first program, hosted by Zete and Kappa Alpha Theta, was a play titled *Low Level Panic*, which centered around the lives of three young women and the issues they faced. The performance was followed by a lengthy discussion of the topics brought out by the play.

The second program dealt with abortion. The junior class, under the leadership of Rick Gomez '91, sponsored the first junior symposium this year. The symposium attempted to bring an educated perspective to a volatile issue. As part of the symposium, Zete sponsored pro-choice and pro-life movies.

In addition to being involved with educational issues on campus, Zete has become an integral part of the cultural life at Dartmouth. Many popular campus bands have at least one Zete as a member. Bill Lehan '92 not only plays the saxophone for his band, Head of the Stacks, but also sings with the famous Dartmouth Aires. The house takes pride in the musical abilities of its members and makes an effort both to hire their bands for parties

and to sponsor events with the Aires. The group will be singing at the Gold Coast later in the term, an engagement cosponsored by the house.

Zete has also continued a strong commitment to community service. Bill Levin '90 has built the Wishing Well into a highly respected and very successful organization by granting wishes for children at the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital. Always concerned with children's welfare, Zetes spent the day at David's House preparing it for winter and performing general maintenance. David's House provides low cost or, in special cases, free lodging for the parents of children at the hospital. Professor Wiencke joined our community service effort by collecting canned food for the needy of the Upper Valley.

Through the work of Paul Hill '90, Zete has added recycling to its activities. The college began to recycle last year and, over the summer, included the Greek system in the project. Each Friday, the college picks up the house's newspaper for recycling. Recycling plastic is next on the college's list.

We hope Zete will continue to uphold its tradition of cultural, educational, and community concerns under the leadership of Mark Elliot '91, the new Alpha Phi.

Having met the Hulk, Stephen was able to draw strength from the memories as he underwent chemotherapy and radiation treatments during his long battle with leukemia. Another wish was granted to seven-year-old Ben. Ben requested a sleeping bag to take with him to Camp Sunshine, a cancer camp on Lake Sebago in Maine. We granted Ben's wish and also threw a birthday party for him at David's House, a local home-away-from-home for families with hospitalized children.

Of late, the Wishing Well has set up two funds at the Hitchcock Medical Center. One fund will aid needy families who have children in the infant intensive care unit; the other is the "Sunny Day Fund," a financial reserve for children who need long-term care but have the strength to venture beyond the hospital's confines.

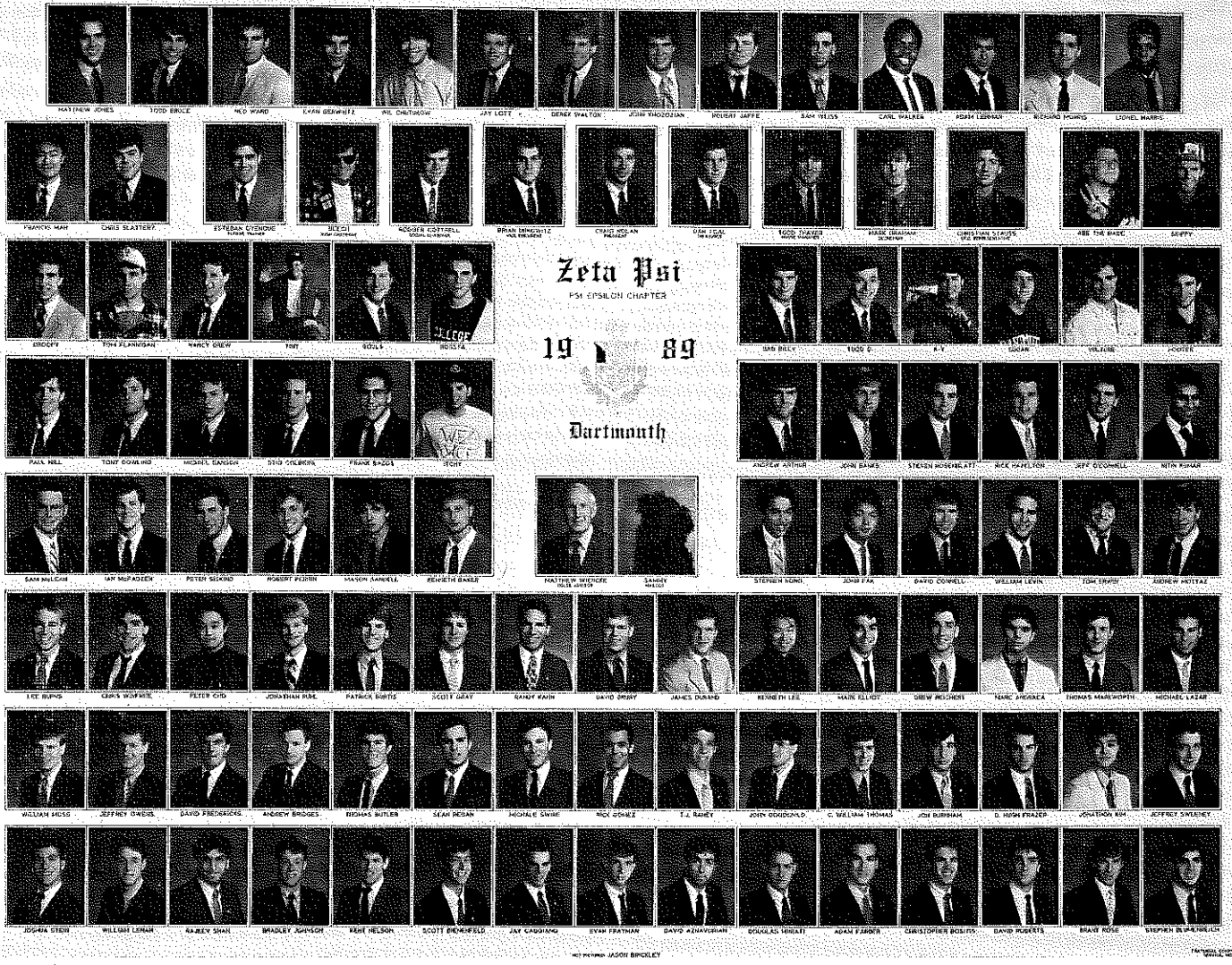

The letters *Zeta* and *Psi* spelled championship this term. *Zeta* began the fall hoping to capture the intramural football championship. *Sigma Nu* was the team's first obstacle, and *Zeta* rose to the challenge with a 6-0 victory. The scoring punch was provided by Steve "0" Rosenblatt '90, who caught a deflected Dan Toal '90 pass and dove into the end zone among the *Sigma Nu* defenders. The Johnson brothers, Andrew '90 and Smokey '92, anchored a strong offensive line.

In the next game, *Zeta* tied a tough *SAE* team, 0-0. The only bright spot of the game was "Big T's" superb punting, which kept the "sleep and eaters" deep within their own territory. *Zeta* won the final game of the season when *Chi Gam* forfeited.

In the semifinals of the playoffs, *Zeta* met a tenacious *Sigma Nu* club. Steve Rosenblatt once again rose to the occasion and picked off a *Sigma Nu* pass and returned it for a big TD. At the end of the first half, Rich "My Own Emotion" Morris '90 pulled in a short flair pass from Dan Toal, decked a defender, hurdled a fallen *Nu* lodger, and trekked 90 yards for the touchdown in his distinct "land rover" style. For the rest of the game, the *Zeta* defense, led by Todd "The Mayor" Thayer, dominated the action except for a freak play when defensive back Kent Nelson '92 was caught "snackin' on the job" and a *Sigma Nu* player stripped an interception away from him and ran it in for a 50-yard TD. *Zeta*

won, 14-6, and advanced to the championship.

In the final, *Zeta* met a tough *SAE* team. Their first meeting of the season ended in a 0-0 tie. Quarterback Dan Toal was duck hunting in Virginia, so Rich Morris handled the QB chores. And handle them he did, as he hit Pat Burtis '91 for a 20-yard TD strike. That was all the *Zetes* needed as they held on to win, 7-0. Special applause should go to the linemen in the pits who blocked unselfishly and harangued opposing QBs: John Pak '90, Dave Roberts '92, Tom Erwin '90, Andy Mottaz '90 (even though he ran the wrong way with an interception), and Rick Hazelton '90.

Due to his dominating play at wide receiver and defensive back during the season, Steve Rosenblatt received the "bloody shirt" award, given to the player who best embodies those qualities of Rick Hazelton '90.
