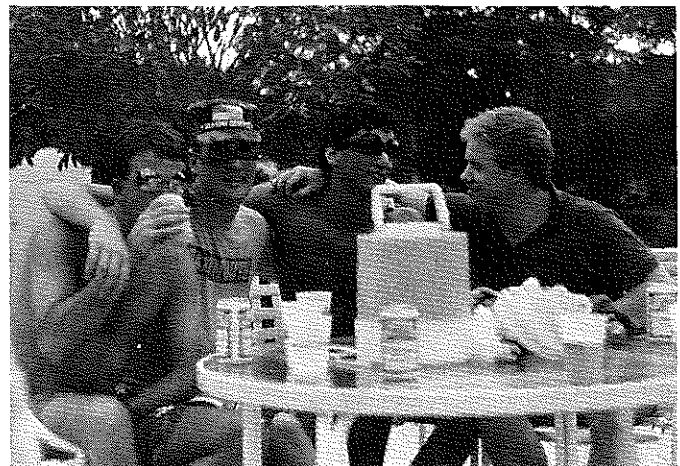

Energetic Zetes Continue House Improvements

The work done around the house in the past few months can be described primarily as maintenance and repair. With our active winter term social calendar of parties and rush activities, we had to make good use of the time that was left for improvements to the physical plant. The brothers did an admirable job in maintaining a clean and attractive environment. Repair work has included replacing broken windows, rebuilding some furniture, resurfacing a wall, and replacing chipped tiles on the basement floor.

Our cleaning process has been augmented this term by a local cleaning service, which comes once every other week and concentrates cleaning efforts on the bathroom and kitchen. One innovative idea this winter was weatherproofing the windows throughout the house. For a minimal price we were able to cover the windows of the basement, living room, and kitchen with plastic. The work was very successful; we were able to eliminate the arctic conditions of past winters and can now look forward to a toasty house and lower fuel bills for many winters to come.

As a result of the fine work of the brothers this term, we passed fire and housekeeping inspections with flying colors and managed to obtain another "pass" on our chimney work, which has since been completed. The mason completed major repairs to the south chimney structure, including resurfacing of the cap, re-pointing of the entire chimney, chimney flashing repairs, removal of vines, and installation of a flue damper system, which will help save heat by not allowing it to escape through the flue.

Having focused on a highly successful rush, we are optimistic that we will be able to "keep up the good work." Many of the improvements and renovations that we were unable to complete during the past term can be handled efficiently with the help of a strong pledge class. Some of the areas considered for further work are the "tube room," the basement ceiling, and the library.
