ZETES REMAIN ACTIVE

The Zeta Psi actives continue to make valuable contributions to the Upper Valley and the house itself. The tenth annual Monte Carlo Night during freshmen Parents' weekend was a social and financial success. This year's proceeds went to the United Way of the Upper Valley.

There also has been a revived interest in sponsoring educational and cultural events at the chapter house. For example, ABC News U.N. Correspondent Lou Cioffi recently spoke to the brothers about his career. The informal nature of the discussion made it interesting and insightful. There is an open invitation to all Zeta alumni who may wish to share their experiences with the undergraduates in a similar forum in the future.

Finally, the brothers and pledges are making further improvements to the physical plant, using their own money and volunteer labor. After finishing the new kitchen, they have moved up to the third floor and are in the process of rebuilding the windows and walls. The finished product will showcase a new floor and carpet as well as more comfortable furniture. These improvements should make the house more attractive, as well as moving closer to the Minimum Standards requirements.

SPRING RUSH NETS 31

Despite the fact that the number of males in the incoming classes is smaller than ever, Zeta Psi managed to capture 31 of the top prospects for the class of 1987. Rush chairmen Todd Williamson '84 and Tim Codd '84 achieved this feat with only 32 bids awarded — a clear indication of the commitment of these pledges.

The emphasis, as always, was on quality rather than large numbers. This year's class is talented and diverse, with representatives of seven Dartmouth sports (including football, baseball, and lacrosse) and a myriad of artistic and drama organizations and activities. Class unity has developed quickly under the watchful eye of pledge trainer Mike Salzhauser '84, who has encouraged and received enthusiastic participation. The wide variety of pledge/brother activities includes the annual Montreal voyage and the Hinman Cabin house meeting. The weekly firewatch and pledge burgers remain an integral part of the pledge period.

This year's seniors graduated with confidence after our second consecutive strong rush. As well, all Zetes can be proud of this most recent harvest of Zete timber.

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Zeta Psi named O'Connor Prize winner

Citing its "significant turnaround over the past few years," Assistant Dean of the College Lee Levison recently presented Zeta Psi fraternity with the O'Connor Prize.

The prize is presented annually to the fraternity or sorority with the best combination of a high grade point average, successive intramural successes and effective administrative standards. In addition, the executive committee of the IFC "talked subjectively about the contributions of various fraternities to the community," Levison said.

An anonymous grant of \$500 this year gave the prize more substance, according to Levison. Zeta Psi was presented with \$300, with first runner-up Alpha Chi Omega receiving \$150 and second runner-up Delta Psi Delta receiving \$50.

Levison hopes that the prize, which he called "a non-prize in the past," will become more visible in order to provide greater incentive for the fraternities. Increased competition between the houses could, he believes,

increase their contribution to the community.

Zeta Psi President Chris Stoffel said that "everyone is proud of it, it's a nice prize" and praised it for "shedding some light on the positive impact of fraternities" in contrast to the negative publicity they have received over the past year.

Stoffel attributed the "turnaround" cited by Levison to the enthusiasm and motivation of the brothers. "We were really fired up last year," he said, "we had a really good rush and became more visible on campus, plus we just have a lot of people who really care about the house."

Stoffel expressed some skepticism over the criteria for deciding the winner, saying it reflected "what kind of graces you're in with the administration" as much as how much the fraternity helps the community.

Zeta Psi's involvement with the IFC and its "innovative programming" influenced the committee's decision, Levison said. He added that the mem-

bers were "very much on the cutting edge with regard to their social and community programs, adding up to a very positive feeling with regard to their input."

Though he said he thought the prize was a nice gesture, Stoffel said the house would make the same effort without it. "I would think most houses, just out of pride, are going to worry about GPA's and intramurals," he said.

Levison said he feels that the prize is still ambiguous and wants to work with the executive committee to improve its substance. While Levison said the money would go to sponsor academic or social programs, Stoffel said it would probably go toward improvements in the house's physical plant.

The prize includes a cup, displayed in the Collis Center, on which the winner's name is engraved each year. Last year it was won by Sigma Phi Epsilon. While both Levison and Stoffel said the prize needs some improving, they agreed that it is a good thing for both the fraternity and the College.
