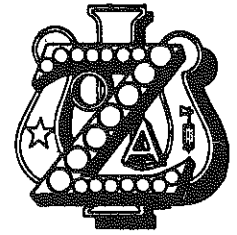

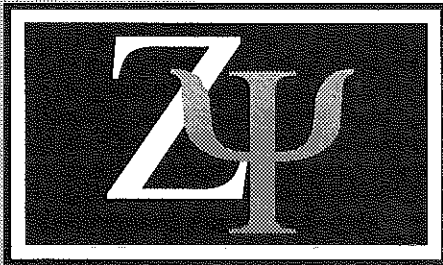

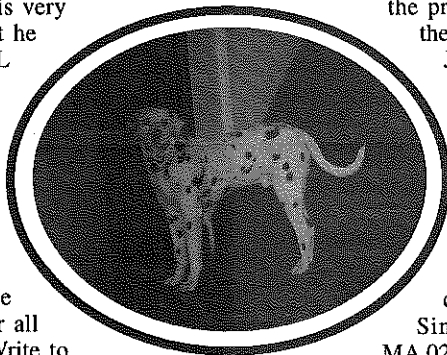


## Alumni News

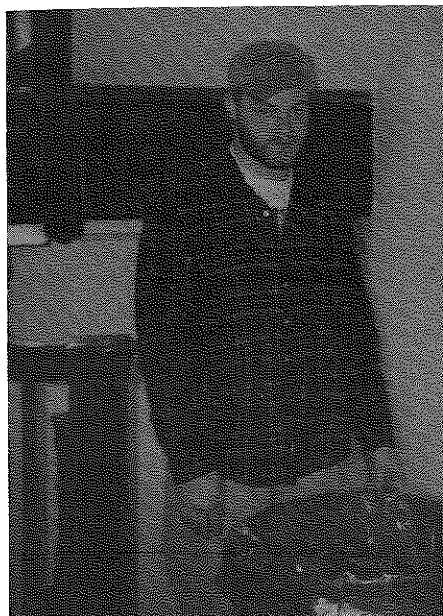

## Computer Program Saves House Managers' Time

In an effort to save the amount of time it takes house managers to assign brothers to cleanup crews and to make sure that brothers get assigned jobs fairly and evenly, Peter "Hoss" Mancoll '97 wrote a computer program this winter that assigns crews and keeps track of the type and number of crews done so far.

Affectionately named "Skynet," after the evil computer in the *Terminator* films, it takes up little permanent memory and uses little RAM. With one keystroke, one can assign cleanup crews, pull up a listing of the various brothers and the type and number of crews that they've done, or make sure that a brother does not get a crew for a particular week. Instead of having to figure out who should get which cleanup crews

and typing out the various names of the brothers and the crew names, a house manager can have the program assign the crews and write it all out instantly. In addition, after the program was e-mailed to each brother over the computer network, each could forecast on his own computer which crews he would probably get throughout the term.

The program follows two rules for assigning crews: 1) Assign crews to those brothers who have done the fewest crews so far; 2) For those who get crews for a particular week, assign them the crews that they have done least often. Peter Mancoll still hopes to find a way to show this program off during a job interview.
