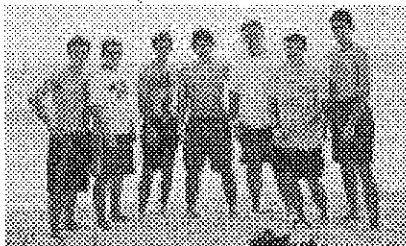
New Members Join House

Zetes Gear Up For Second Run For The Kids

On May 13, 2001, Zeta Psi is holding its second annual Zete Run for the Kids to benefit David's House. David's House is a home for children with chronic diseases and their families. The concept was designed to give children a more comfortable alternative to the cold and intimidating hospital environment. David's House relies heavily on fundraisers like the Zete Run to remain in operation.

This Zete springtime tradition began last year with the first Zete Run for the Kids, which was a 5K run around Hanover that involved 40 runners and raised over \$700, thanks to the hard work by race captain Rob "Tomax" Costello '01. As a result, last year's race became the biggest programming event for Zete in many years, perhaps ever. Zete also earned a place in the Patrons Society at David's House, which is a distinguished group of generous

donors.

This year, Zete's goal is to at least double the number of runners participating in the 5K run. Because we received a small grant from the 15 Webster Avenue Fund to spend on the race, the race will feature a grand prize that all runners will be eligible to win. Smaller prizes, provided by local businesses such as Everything But Anchovies Pizzeria and the Dartmouth Bookstore, will be awarded to top finishers.

Since the winner of last year's race won in under 17 minutes, Zete has the potential to attract some very competitive runners. Regardless of the winning time, though, we're hoping to build on last year's success and draw a large field of runners. Zete is proud to help an organization like David's House to reach its goals.

Zetes Show Diligence In Serving The House

Visitors to 8 Webster Avenue might not recognize the inside of the house. Over the past two years, the brothers have completely renovated the common spaces of the house, primarily through their own labor. They've refloored, repainted, rewired, and rebuilt all of the areas of the facility that had fallen into disrepair.

Several brothers were instrumental in refurbishing the chapter house. Former Treasurers Jason Gelman '00 and Brian Landry-Wilson '01 funded our escapades with astonishing def-

ness. Brothers Bob Levine '01, Matt Deninger '01, Eric Schatz '02, and Ryan Krauch '01 all played tremendous roles in some of our larger projects, including gutting the basement, rewiring the house's computer and phone lines, and adding new light fixtures.

A special hats off goes to the most recent fall-term pledge class, who, led by the scholarly Adam Goldberg '03, built a closet in the basement (from scratch) to house our music and refrigeration technology. Indispens-

able to the entire process has been the cubby-dwelling James Mills '00, who has tackled just about every area of the house at one time or another, doing several projects on his own. We will miss Sweeney greatly, if he ever leaves.

Below is a list of all of the projects we've done over the past two years. It's been a blast, and I hope our work will serve Zetes for years to come.

BEDROOMS:

- ran new wires to all 15 bedrooms and all common areas for telephone, cable television, and fiber optic network
- renovated the seven rooms not renovated in 1999 (8 of 15 rooms renovated in 1999):
 - 101: recarpeted, added new lofted bed, new hanging-light fixture
 - 103 (library): recarpeted, repainted, added new hanging-light fixture, secured window
 - 201: repainted, recarpeted, added door to separate two rooms for better use as a double, added light fixtures
 - 204: repainted, recarpeted, added new bed and mattress
 - 206: wallpapered, repainted, recarpeted, added fan for ventilation (room has no exterior windows), replaced light switch and fixture, replaced bed frame and mattress
 - 303: built full second story, wired it for electricity, telephone, television, ethernet, fixed leak in roof
 - 303A: shelving/reorganized closet under roof eaves, repainted, recarpeted

MAJOR STRUCTURAL CHANGES:

- replaced boiler, oil tanks, added new hot water tank/heater
- tore down and rebuilt house chimneys, poured new chimney caps
- reattached fire escape to brick exterior in weak places

EXTERIOR:

- removed fir tree in front of house, repainted column behind it,

- added two new bushes to match the rest
- repainted letters on front and side of house, repainted all exterior trim not painted in 1999
- repainted rear cement stairs
- relighted main entrance
- restored volleyball court with new sand

THIRD FLOOR:

- relighted third-floor chapter room with new hanging-light fixtures
- repainted third-floor chapter room, second-floor hallway, kitchen
- repaired all third-floor storage closets for easier access

SECOND FLOOR:

- refilled shower, replaced both shower mechanisms

FIRST FLOOR:

- replaced lighting fixtures and switches in entranceway foyer
- rewired great room for wall sconce capability

BASEMENT:

- repainted entire basement, replaced broken floor tiles, replaced light fixtures
- removed wall in basement, created one large social space
- added secure storage closet in rear of basement for new refrigerator and stereo system
- added new basement alarm system
