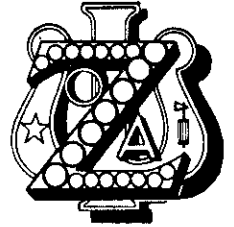

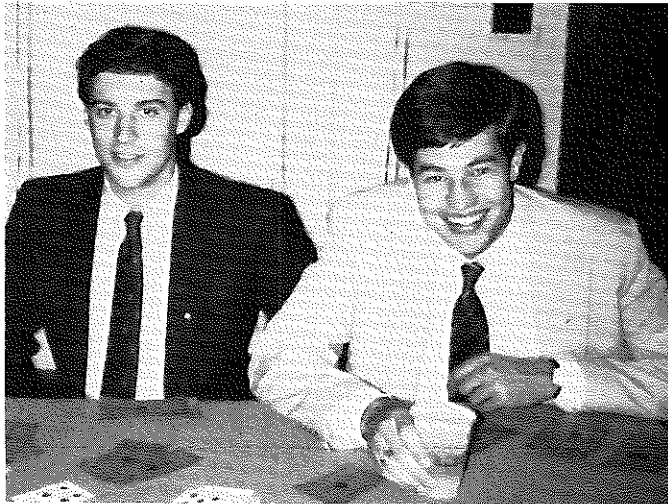
## Psi Epsilon Chapter Creates "The Wishing Well"

Funded exclusively by Dartmouth's Greek organizations and their alumni, The Wishing Well will grant the wishes of these children—buy them a special toy, send them on a trip, even arrange a meeting with a celebrity. We hope to create a smile in times of extreme challenge, to stop the clock and let some happiness prevail.

On April 26, 1989, Zeta Psi's Wishing Well presented three-year-old Ryan LeFevre of Thetford with enough equipment (over \$400!) to spend a few days at a campground with his family. The equipment will enable the young boy to enjoy some time with his family away from the hospital where he has been receiving treatment for histiocytosis-X, a rare cancer-like disease.

This project's aim is to bring a ray of happiness to children who have suffered as no child should. It is through avenues such as The Wishing Well that Zeta and the Greek system is able to display its compassion and warmth for these children and their families as they face their difficult challenges ahead.

During the last few terms, in addition to maintaining a strong social schedule, the brothers of Zeta Psi have taken an active role in campus and community events. These events have included educational and cultural programming for the Dartmouth community as well as community service projects for the Upper Valley.

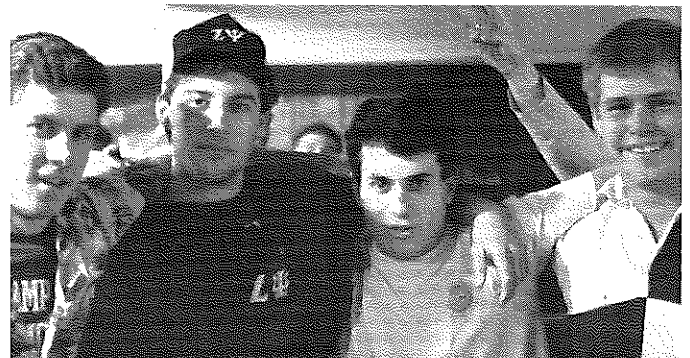
The brothers were particularly active during winter term, when Zeta hosted many educational events. The house showed the film *Eye on the Prize* as part of the college celebration of Martin Luther King Week. We attended a lecture by Professor Vincent Scully of Yale, held in honor of our advisor and brother, Professor Mathew Wiencke, and hosted a lecture by Dartmouth Professor Ronald Green. Professor Green's lecture, titled "Growing Up Male," discussed the problems men face growing up in American society.

Zeta Psi also demonstrated its cultural side during the winter. The house hosted two concerts, one performed by the Dodeca-phonics, a coeducational group, and another by the famous Dartmouth Aires. The Dodecs concert was cosponsored by the Russell Sage, Butterfield, and Gold Coast dormitories in an effort to better integrate the campus. Also aimed at demonstrating Greek and non-Greek cooperation, the Aires concert provided the class of 1990 with an opportunity to announce the winners of the raffle. The raffle raised money for the pediatric playroom at the Hitchcock Hospital.

The raffle was just the beginning of Zeta's commitment to community service. Under the leadership of Paul Hill '90, the house has developed a relationship with the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital. Every week during winter term, Zetas went to the hospital and assembled mouth-to-mouth resuscitation masks for every room in the hospital. This spring, the relationship continued when Zetas assisted the hospital with its cholesterol awareness project and made a \$1,000 donation to the Norris Cotton Cancer Center. The money was raised during the annual Monte Carlo Night and was donated in memory of Todd Bruce '89. Lastly, The Wishing Well, which was founded by Bill Levin '90, granted its first wish in late April.

Zeta's community service activities were not limited to the hospital. The often planned but never completed painting of the Listen Center in Lebanon was finally finished, and each week Paul Hill '90 and Sam McLean '90 carried coal to an elderly woman to heat her home. We hope that the future holds similar opportunities for educational, cultural, and community service programming.
