Philanthropy Events High On Zete's Priority List

Despite the tremendous amount of time that the brothers have spent preparing for Minimum Standards, Zete has continued to sponsor cultural and philanthropic events throughout the year and is planning even more events for the upcoming spring.

One of the more unusual educational events seen at Zete in the past few years was the talk given by professor Neal Walls of the religion department on "Cultic Sex: The Worship of Ishtar." Over 25 people, both brothers and non-brothers, came to the house to hear about the characteristics of some ancient religions. Everyone present enjoyed the talk, and many interesting questions were raised after the talk.

One of the most important areas of Zete involvement and interaction with the community is through community service. Zete teamed up with Delta Delta Delta Sorority and hosted a spaghetti dinner at the house. The brothers helped cook and serve the meal, and, by charging \$3 per person, we were able to raise over \$200 for Norris Cotton Cancer Research. Another way Zetes give back to the community is through our continuing involvement with the Wishing Well. As one of the organization's founders, Bill Levin '90 has helped grant wishes for needy children who are patients at Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital. Zete is planning a fund-raiser called "pennies from heaven" for this worthy charity during the spring. Brothers will go door-to-door on campus and ask people to donate to this worthy cause.

Since there will be no freshmen in the house this spring, we have decided not to have Monte Carlo night this freshman Parents Weekend. However, we will be replacing this event with another fund-raiser that we will hold with Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority. This year, we plan to hold a raffle and donate the proceeds to Norris Cotton.

An achievement that we can all be proud of is the high academic standard that Zete has. During the winter term, Zete had the highest GPA of all the fraternities.

As usual, we plan to continue the high standards of cultural and educational programming that our predecessors have set. It is important to us that the community sees us as a positive force, and we are working hard to maintain Zete's fine reputation.

Dear Fellow Elders:

As you can read in the reports of the various undergraduate officers, a great deal of time, labor, and money has been recently devoted to the repair and renovation of the physical plant in anticipation of the Minimum Standards review. Nearly \$20,000 and hundreds of hours of work later, the house looks better than it has in several (many?) years. For this the current crop of undergraduates should be commended.

In addition to the physical structure, the internal dynamics and goals of the fraternity are subject to scrutiny in the Minimum Standards process. While these elements of the chapter are less easily discerned in weekend visits, I believe that Psi Epsilon remains a strong, diverse (a word one hears far more often at Dartmouth than anywhere else in the free world) group of young men with a common interest in brotherhood that would be familiar to alumni from any decade. In short, things seem to be going well in Hanover despite the exigencies of delayed rush, etc.

No letter would be complete without a sincere plea for contributions, both monetary and intellectual. As for finances, it should be noted that all of the money spent on renovations was derived from the undergraduates' operating budget and savings account. None was from the elder corporation, in part because we do not have a "cushion" of any size. Between the 50 percent property tax increase over three years and the continuing obligations of mortgages from prior renovations, money passes through and does not generate very much interest. We sincerely thank the hundreds of you who have given over the past few years and ask for your continued support.

As for intellectual contributions, the plea is equally simple. Other than brief conversations at reunions and Homecoming, the undergraduate officers and the officers of the elder corporation hear very little from the alumni. Therefore, consider this an open invitation for criticism, suggestion, comment, and, perhaps, active involvement in the affairs of the elder corporation. Glasnost is not limited to the Soviet Union.

As is the custom, I close by wishing you all the best and reporting that a new, clean welcome mat has been placed for you in front of the newly painted door at 8 Webster Avenue.

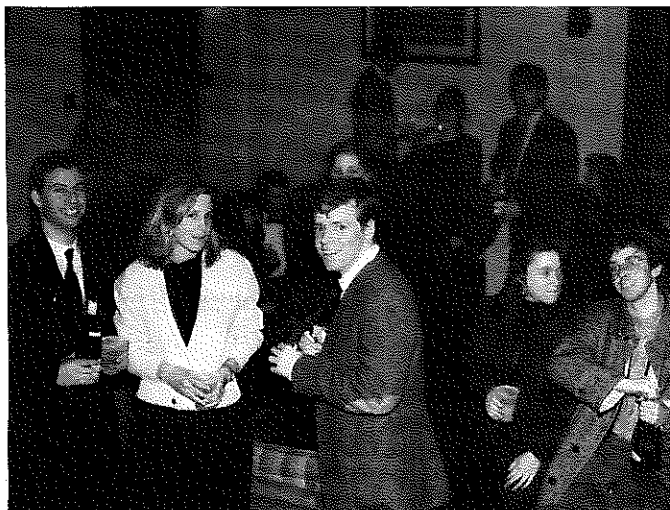

Brothers Compete In IMs

To overcome the effects of cabin fever, the Zetes left the cozy confines of 8 Webster Avenue to seek intramural glory.

Due to the graduation of many "arm chair hockey players," Zete teamed with AXA in hockey. The one pre-season bright spot was that John "Ole Yeller" Khozozian '89 returned to lead a green Zete/AXA squad. The season began on a sour note as we lost to Heorot and an abysmal Fayerweather squad. However, a playoff spot was salvaged when Zete upset Tuck, 4-2. In this game, "King Kazoo" had the game-winning goal, while Mason Sandell '90 sparkled in the net. On defense, Mike Swire '91 held off numerous Tuck onslaughts.

Zete opened the playoffs with an easy victory over Heorot, 9-1, in which Frank Bazos had seven goals. In the semifinals, the Zete/AXA squad was decimated while Bazos and one of the top players from AXA were away on interviews. Thus, we forfeited to the Dartmouth Medical School.

In basketball Zete fared well. During the regular season, Zete beat AXA, Theta Delt, and Beta but dropped contests against Tri-Kap and Chi Gam. Steady performances were turned in by Steve Rosenblatt '90, David Azavorian '92, Jeff Sweeney '92, Evan Frayman '92, Dave Roberts '92, Andy Mottaz '90, and Tom "T" Erwin '90. Azavorian was a veritable killer from the three-point line, while Roberts and Erwin dominated the boards. In the playoffs, Zete beat Theta Delt, 40-32, and then lost to Sig Ep, 42-36. With eight minutes left, Zete was down by 17 and pulled to within five after attacking Sig Ep with a full-court press. However, it wasn't enough. With Roberts hurt and Tom "The Orator" Erwin absent, the exhausted (no reserves either) Zete squad lacked the size to gain control of the boards.

Our winter term produced no championships. Yet we're primed to challenge for the softball ("A" and "B") and lacrosse titles this spring.

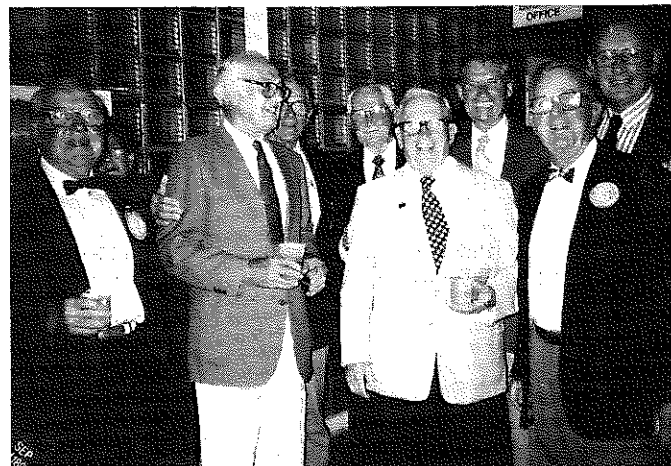
Our Zeta Psi Alumni Write

Delayed Rush Doesn't Dampen Zete Spirit

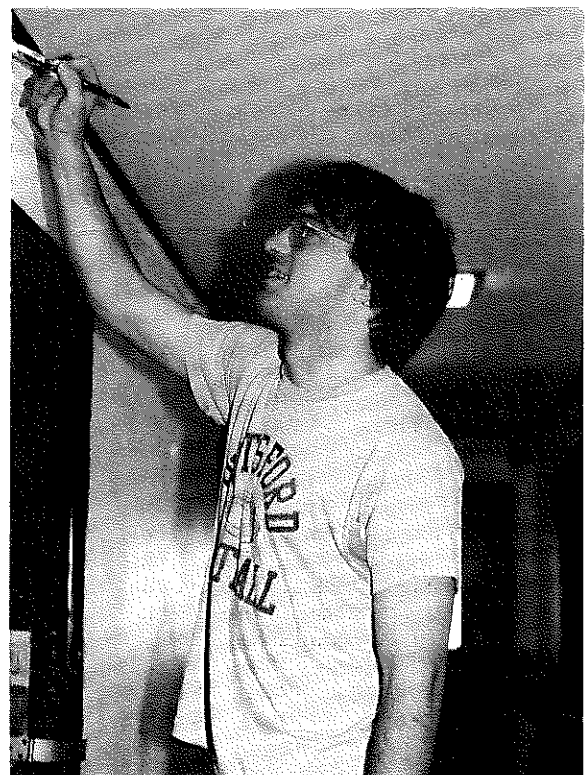
