House Refurbished

In the past year the house has drastically changed its complexion. Not only has the living room floor been refinished and new butcher block couches been added to the room, but the exterior has had such renovations as a fresh coat of paint, repaired slate roof, and the reconstruction of a rapidly deteriorating front pillar. Recently, the library was completely reconstructed by the '85 pledge class, and received many compliments when it was rededicated in October to John Cogswell, Zete, '31.

Many renovations such as the living room floor and the front pillar were done by the brothers which has greatly augmented the potency of each renovation dollar. But while these renovations have all been done relying upon alumni contributions, loans, and house funds, there is still a need for future renovations. The tile to the basement floor is deteriorating rapidly and the make-shift House Kitchen is becoming almost impossible with over fifteen brothers cooking all of their meals in the house. In the far future, we look forward to replacing even the threadbare carpeting in the hallways and stairways.

To increase revenues of the house, we have both increased the insulation of pipes as well as lowered the thermostat during the winter with an automatic timer. This resulted in a savings of over \$1200 dollars in fuel costs this last winter. As a result of these savings, coupled with the alumni support we have been able to renovate the house relatively quickly while keeping our debt service quite low.

With your support, we can continue to renovate the house so that it will eventually reflect the true strength of the brotherhood.
