Alumni Input Solicited

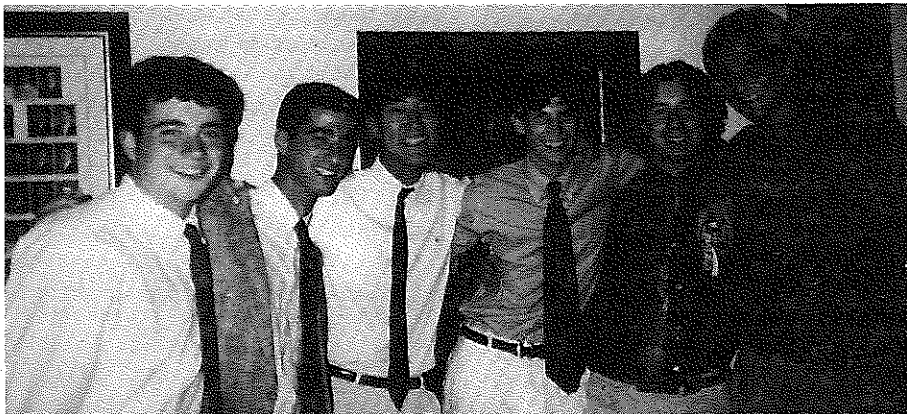
Dear Fellow Alumni:

Improvements Brighten Life At Zete House

The last year has brought several improvements to 8 Webster Avenue. First of all, the double in the chapter room has been converted into two singles. Last fall we hired a contractor to build a door directly into the inside room. This gives added privacy to the occupants of both rooms and actually makes the smaller room feel much bigger.
