Minutes Of Annual Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Rich Roberts '83, president of the corporation, at 11:00 a.m., October 21, 1995, at 8 Webster Avenue, Hanover, New Hampshire. Present were the following officers and directors: Michael Salzhauer '84 (secretary), Gordon Prescott '83 (treasurer), and Peter Scotch '84 (director). Several undergraduate officers, including Greg Jensen '96 (president), were also in attendance.

Gordon Prescott presented the treasurer's report, which, in summary, indicated income of approximately \$21,000 and expenses of approximately \$23,400. The issues of rent payments from the undergraduates and the allocation of cost of the liability insurance premiums to both the college and the national were discussed.

There was additional discussion regarding the schedule for payment of past-due rent, and it was determined that the officers would work with the undergraduate officers to set the timing and amounts of such pay-

ments. Also, the officers were to contact both the college insurance agent and the national's insurance agent in order to eliminate any duplication of coverage and to attempt to reduce the amount of the premiums.

Alumni relations were discussed at length. The undergraduates have changed the duties of the vice president so that his major role is to work on improving alumni relations. The point was made that the appearance of the house and the courtesy of the brothers toward alumni are critical to retaining good will.

The undergraduates presented a general list of capital improvements to the house that had resulted from a recent inspection. It was decided that some kind of capital fundraising program would be undertaken in conjunction with the corporation before the end of the fall term. The alumni officers were to respond with suggestions after receipt of the (continued on page three)
